Academic Program Highlights

Project-based learning (PBL) and formational learning experiences (FLEX) where students do real work to meet a real need for real people are embedded throughout the K-12 curriculum.

STEM offerings are robust with science classes in Engineering, Biological Sciences, Physical Sciences, and Health Sciences. Signature courses included Genetics, Meteorology, Environmental Science, Introduction to Health Sciences, and Foundations for Health Professionals. Technology courses include Computer Science Principles and Artificial Intelligence, Web Design, Graphic Design, Cryptology, Gaming and Animation. Students can also participate in HOSA (Health Occupation Students of America) and NASA ICE (NASA's Cryospheric Sciences Program).

Our Business students can take electives such as International Business, Macroeconomics, Microeconomics, Financial Markets and Entrepreneurship, and participate in DECA (Distributive Education Clubs of America).

Students who continue taking a world language beyond the two-year requirement are expected to earn the Global Seal of Bilingualism during their fourth year.

Speech, Personal Wellness and Financial Literacy are required courses to build life-skills such as public speaking, social and emotional wellbeing and fiscal responsibility.

Online learning is often used as an opportunity to enroll in additional Advanced Placement Courses and other areas of student interest.

All students complete a junior research paper in MLA format and a senior research paper in APA format. Seniors can also choose to complete independent capstone projects.

High school students participate in student-led chapels, small group mentorship groups, service learning, and college and career readiness modules.

To be eligible for a diploma from WCS, a student must complete the course of studies prescribed by the WCS Board of Trustees and successfully complete 130 credits. Full-year courses are worth 5 credits and semester courses are worth 2.5 credits.

All WCHS students are expected to take the SAT. The mean scores achieved by our students for the most recent years are as follows:

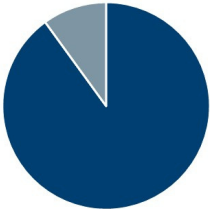

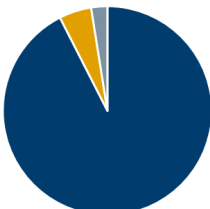

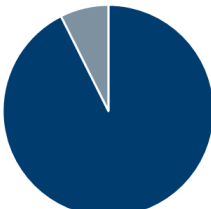
