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Rise Up & Build Together We Can!

ust as we joined together as a community to build a new Library Media Center, which opened in late 2013, now we unite to construct a new fieldhouse and fine arts center. It all springs from a long-range plan developed to address space and utilization challenges that came to the forefront during our most recent accreditation review. This plan, approved by the Board of Trustees in 2012, set the wheels in motion to complete the new facilities by 2017.

This past summer, as a search was under way for a new advancement director to lead the capital campaign, three committed WCS parents took leadership in launching the effort and introducing it to the WCS community. We owe an enormous debt of gratitude to John Esler, Tony Brookhouse and Tom Swaim for leading the way.

The \$17.9 million campaign, named *Rise Up & Build*, was inspired by the Bible story of the prophet Nehemiah, who challenged the people of Jerusalem to rebuild the city walls destroyed by the Babylonians. The seemingly impossible project took an astounding 52 days, with each individual and each family pitching in what they could. Likewise, the WCS community is being encouraged to work together with each person playing a part, accomplishing what on the surface appears to be a difficult challenge for a small community.

Currently, over \$15.475 million has been raised of the \$17.9 million needed for the campaign. Raising this amount in just eight months has allowed WCS to save over \$1.65 million through a design-build contract. An additional \$4.5 million in savings is being realized through the shared construction cost of building both facilities at the same time.

Starting in December, a 3:1 matching campaign gift opportunity from a group of anonymous WCS donors of up to \$2 million was introduced and remains in effect. As of our publication date, site work is nearly complete on a new parking lot to accommodate the needs of the new structure and to relocate the playground, which occupies the future footprint of the new facility. Other preliminary steps to the spring groundbreaking are also taking place.

In the next pages, we are excited to share the plans and our progress!

The initial design work was performed by Dixon-Salo Architects Incorporated. The construction firm of JM Coull Inc. has been selected to complete the project.

Room for Play

Since the new athletic and arts facility will be located on the site of the current playground, plans are being implemented to relocate the playground and enhance the recess experience for students. The playground committee has been busy meeting weekly since September. The current plan is to move the playground to the far side of the soccer field (and the clearing of trees and moving of earth has already begun). There will also be a smaller area closer to the school building near the Janet Colby garden. A playground designer has been retained to incorporate creative/ imaginative play areas and include activities to utilize gross motor skills, all within a natural environment using natural materials. The ADA accessible playground will also have a multi-function stage area to enhance opportunities for imaginative play.

The existing playground equipment was moved in several stages during the first week of March so that progress can continue on the new building while ensuring students have a place to play. Most of the new equipment will be added during the summer.

WCS Fine Arts Enters a New Stage

WCS Fine Arts has faced numerous challenges since its early days. As the school has grown, so have the demands on the Krull Auditorium. Dividing time among the athletic programs, drama productions, musical performances, and gym classes has made it difficult to prepare sets, find storage for props and costumes, and hold regular rehearsals. The WCS Strings, Choir, Band, and the vocal ensembles have found it necessary to rent facilities off-site for scheduling reasons and for appropriate acoustics.

In the new arts facility, dedicated space will be available for storage, rehearsals and performances, and timing the use of the stage will be less

complex. Professional quality acoustics and lighting will be built into the design. Gallery space will also be available for displaying student art.

arisa McIlrath came to WCS as a freshman in 1993. She auditioned for *Little Women* and to her surprise was selected for the lead role as Jo March. That was her first introduction to the school and to the drama program. Marisa explained that drama became a strong foundation for her high school experience, where she developed her very best friends—who remain so to this day—and for her future aspirations in theater.

After participating in every WCS production from that point until graduation, Marisa went on to attend Emerson College and earned a Bachelor's in Fine Arts, then on to Harvard for a



Master's of Arts in Education. Soon after, in 2002, she joined the Huntington Theatre Company in Boston where she today is an education associate and drama instructor. In addition to producing a full schedule of professional plays featuring renowned actors/ actresses, Huntington has one of the largest educational

departments of any regional theater company. It sponsors performance competitions, provides artists in residence for the Boston Public Schools, holds afterschool programs and summer theater institutes, and creates and collaborates with schools in student productions. The Huntington Theatre Company has received awards from the National Endowment for the Arts, the President's Council on the Arts and Humanities, Massachusetts House of Representatives and Senate, and City of Boston's City Council.

"I've spent a significant amount of time in my professional life making the case for arts in education and, specifically, advocating for theatre experiences for students at the secondary level," Marisa said. "I feel great pride in knowing that my once small school is growing and has taken significant steps to provide enrichment opportunities for students outside the core curriculum. Through this building project a commitment to the arts is secured. I look forward to seeing what the future generations of students will accomplish as a result of this investment."



Powering Through CHALLENGES

Sarah MacKay Robinson ('01)

S arah MacKay Robinson qualified for the U.S. Olympic Marathon trials by running a 2:42:36 at the California International Marathon in Sacramento on Dec. 6. Sarah lives in Seattle and runs for Oiselle, a running and athletic apparel company, where she is the Creative Director. The Olympic Marathon Trials were held Feb. 13 in Los Angeles. Sarah achieved this just 15 months after she and her husband welcomed their first child.

An accomplished runner at WCS and in Central Massachusetts, Sarah made varsity cross country in 7th grade. But her love of running started even earlier. "My first 5k race was the WCS fun run in 6th grade, Sarah said. "I remember feeling so effortless running. At first I was embarrassed to leave my girl-

friends who were run-walking, but the feel of running was too good to care. I felt free and happy. I didn't know how to describe it then, but it empowered me and gave me confidence. When I was running I had a singular focus, I didn't think about looking cool (I didn't) or what anyone thought or anything else. I just ran."

Early in her WCS running career, she was fast and fearless in her competitions, breaking records and prompting college recruiters to fill her mailbox with inquiries. Sarah had a tough road ahead of her, however, enduring multiple knee surgeries in high school. Somehow she always powered through. She was cross country league champion and runner of the year in 10th grade. She had the 2 mile record (11:10.6) and ran in the Foot Locker national cross country championship race at North Carolina State University. In 11th grade meniscus problems prevented her from running in districts or states but she nev-

ertheless was conference champion. In track that same year she broke the mile record (5:19.3) in a dual meet at Northbridge. In her senior year she faced yet another knee surgery and couldn't run until the last three meets of the cross country season, but placed third in the district meet and led her team to second place, qualifying for states. That cross country season, her last, was really special as her sister Rebekah ('07) was a contributing teammate as a 6th grader. Her brother Daniel ('04) also was on a state qualifying team as a freshman that year.

Sarah attended Colorado State University on a partial athletic scholarship and continued training and rehabbing. One fateful afternoon, she and a few friends were in a car accident and Sarah ended up with three broken

vertebrae. In typical fashion, she never gave up; she just kept working and, late in her collegiate career, had some success including a team trip to nationals.



Hard work and persistence finally paid off for Sarah in her December race in Sacramento.

After college, Sarah moved to Seattle and quietly ran competitively, in fits and starts, while beginning her career at Oiselle. She met and married her husband, Owen, and in 2014 gave birth to Penelope, or "PJ," as Sarah calls her. After taking a break for a couple of years and finding a good life/training balance, everything came together at last.

"I actually did one of my first workouts just after PJ on the new WCS track," Sarah recalls. "Mrs. VandenAkker was there with a class playing tennis. We chatted a bit and the flood of memories hit me. She was always excited by my races and encouraging. Mr. Chenet was my first coach. Running the pancake run on a late summer morning was one of my favorites. My mother [Anne Mackay] stepped in as coach and she was great. We had puddle runs and spaghetti dinners. Mr. Vander Baan was coaching the guys and there was always good banter there."

"Running was a really special place for me, a little family of misfits. And certainly my fondest memories of high school. I'd trade my prom dress for my spikes any day. My best memories were running."

Today in her early 30's, Sarah finds herself in the best condition of her life and, with the support of her friends, colleagues and family, she looks forward to a great race in Los Angeles. Congratulations and Godspeed, Sarah!

Friendships Score Biggest

Alex Vander Baan ('05)

WCS students, parents and alumni will most likely remember Alex Vander Baan as the big, 6' 9" power forward who led the 2005 varsity basketball team to the school's first state title. His strength and agility on the court made him a force to be reckoned with in the league and across the state. His numbers and his leadership together made him an attractive Division 1 Collegiate prospect, and Holy Cross College signed him to a four-year basketball scholarship.

His high school achievements were impressive: A three-time Dual Valley Conference All-Star meet ... Named to All-Central Massachusetts and to the Metro West Super Team in 2004 and 2005 ... Totaled 1,299 points and 1,100 rebounds during his high school career. Yet, basketball wasn't Alex's only sport. He was an accomplished cross country runner, a two-time All-State meet. The boys' cross country team had a 61-meet winning streak during his career, winning four Dual Valley Conference titles. From all accounts, it seems as if those things would dominate his memories of high school.

But that's not the way Alex recalls his time at WCS, or at Holy Cross. "Winning the races or the state championship, or on the court in college, that's not where I have my best memories," Alex said. "The team accomplishments were great, but I really enjoyed the long runs and early morning basketball workouts.



To this day, my closest friends are the people I invested time with outside of practice."

"There are a lot of teachable moments in competition, but it's all the hours outside the season when you're working together, that's when you learn the most," he explained. "You learn a lot from your friends and your friendships."

When discussing the new fieldhouse being built at WCS, Alex said he was happy that it was finally coming to fruition. "In my opinion, WCS has always provided one of most well-rounded educational experiences in New England. It's very rare to attend a school where one can play multiple sports, while participating in orchestra and robotics. This is a special quality of WCS. Students have the opportunity to try many different activities, which allows them to discover what they are truly passionate about. This facility will only enhance that experience."

Alex graduated with an economics major from Holy Cross in 2009. Right out of college he worked for an equity trading company in Connecticut, then at Morgan Stanley on the trading desk in New York City. Today, Alex works for Wellington Management and lives in Boston with his wife, Ali.

Finishing Strong

Thomas Rodger ('12)

Some individuals have untapped talents that, once discovered and developed, propel them to great accomplishments. Such is the case with Thomas Rodger, who did not begin competitive running until his junior year at WCS, coming over as a convert from soccer. WCS cross country coach Chris Vander Baan said Thomas was a coach's dream. "His drive to achieve what was expected of him made coaching him easy. He always beat every guy he was supposed to beat. He was selfless and led by his actions in practice and in races. In cross country talk, he was a 'gamer.' Thomas did exactly what I asked of him. He waited in the DVC league meet to cross the exact line in the dirt I had established with him before the meet, then took off and beat the rest of the field to become league champion. Thomas was unique as an athlete as he was able to flick the switch and give one hundred percent."

His junior year of high school, Thomas was team MVP, Dual Valley Conference Co-Runner of the Year and the Central

Massachusetts Division 2 meet champion. He was named to the Telegram & Gazette All-Star Team for



fall sports. In track and field that same year, he qualified for the All-State Meet in both the 800m and 1600m races, with the 1600m relay team placing first at the Central Mass. state meet and finishing 6th at the All-State meet, setting a new school record.

During the 2012 indoor season, Thomas won the 1000m at the Dual Valley Conference championship meet and at the Division 4 state meet, setting a new school record. He was also a member of the 1600m relay team, winning the state meet and competing at the New Balance Indoor Nationals. That year, WCS won its first-ever Indoor District team title. Thomas, captain of both the indoor and outdoor teams, was named a Worcester Telegram & Gazette All-Star for winter sports.

Now a senior Marketing major at Roberts Wesleyan College in Rochester, NY, Thomas led his cross country team and the entire field at the East Coast Conference Championships in 2015, clocking a blazing 25:03 in the 8K, and was named 2015 Men's Runner of the Year. He was also named to the All-Conference First Team for the third year in a row, and finished 10th in the NCAA East Regionals with a 10K time of 31:58, the second fastest time in team history. In track and field, Thomas earned National Christian College Athletic Association All-American honors in the 1500m and in the 4x800 relay in 2015. At an early 2016 indoor Highlander Invitational, he took first place in the 600m.

"Thomas is one of the top three collegiate runners to come out of WCS," Coach Vander Baan concluded.

Her Legacy Lives On

Recently Headmaster Lance Engbers had the pleasant opportunity for a long conversation which reaffirmed his belief that Whitinsville Christian School continues to be a God-centered, student focused institution of learning... as it has been for past 87 years. His conversation with Mr. Louis Hoekstra, the husband of Alice Jellesma Hoekstra, centered on the successful foundation that WCS provided Alice from her start as a second grader to her graduation as an eighth grader in the class of 1948.

Born in Tampa, Florida, on May 22, 1933, Alice moved to Whitinsville with her family when she was seven years old. Since she suffered from the effects of rheumatic fever, the move was made in the hope that her serious health problems might be alleviated farther north. Whether the climate or the experimental drug, Penicillin, or both provided some measure of health, Alice was ready to begin her schooling at WCS on Willow Street as a second grader. She demonstrated a quick mind, a caring spirit, and quiet humility among her peers, who formed a very successful class of 24 students by the time they were eighth graders. Alice's love of learning served her well for she graduated from WCS as the valedictorian of the Class of 1948.

Following her graduation Alice continued her high school education at Northbridge High School, located a short block away from the Willow Street School. In many of her classes, she and her classmates were seated alphabetically. Since "H" for Hoekstra preceded "J" for Jellesma, Alice soon became acquainted with Lou Hoekstra. Lou remembers that Alice's bright mind and quiet, gentle spirit inspired others and attracted him to her. By the time they graduated in 1952, Alice and Lou were dating and talking about marriage. In August of 1953, Alice became Mrs. Lou Hoekstra, sharing a marriage with him that included eleven moves, some of which were overseas, while Lou served in the military for more than 20 years.

Though residual effects of her childhood health problems plagued Alice for her whole life, Lou remembers that she was a very caring mother to their six children, a highly successful leader in military chapel ministries, and later an extremely competent career counselor. Alice often attributed her successes in life to her education at WCS, where she was taught to love learning, to develop strong values, and to demonstrate empathy. By the time that Lou retired from military service, he and Alice settled in Florida, where he became a public school teacher and a part-time administrator until his retirement in 1997.



In their retirement years Alice and Lou took frequent trips in their motor home, traveling throughout the continental 48 states and 12 Canadian provinces. Alice practiced her love of photography on these trips, creating wonderful scrapbooks when they returned home. Alice also used her time to sew, to read, and to continue serving as a positive influence on everyone she met. She never complained about the health challenges that ultimately led to her passing. Her heart and lung problems though led to Alice's passing on September 8, 2011, in Monteverde, FL. After her death, Lou recounted this favorite Scripture passage of Alice's, his wife of 58 years: "For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain" (Philippians 1:21).

Whitinsville Christian School is thankful that its influence on Alice Jellesma Hoekstra lives on as people remember her scholarship, her leadership, her values, and her empathy. May her legacy live on in the lives that WCS touches today... and for time to come!



Congratulations to Leonard P. Krygsman IV ('03) and Kellie Thiesing ('07), who were married on October 12, 2015.


